DEALING WITH AN EVIL AGE

The following article was written by Mother Marie des Douleurs (died 1983) foundress of the Benedictine Sisters of Jesus Crucified. What wisdom written long ago that answers our angst about the politics and state of our world today.

It is quite the vogue, nowadays, not only to think that everything is going very badly, but also to observe that people are getting worse and worse, and to repeat this *ad nauseam*.

Instead of being fascinated by political scandal, why don't we seek out and hold on to, and ourselves set good examples, of professional courage, of hidden heroism, of unselfish virtue? Such examples are to be found all around us. We should be inspired by them, stimulated. This is an excellent apostolate that is within the reach of all of us.

Always seeing evil, incessantly considering it—even deploring it—is certainly demoralizing. Why concern ourselves with what is dead, rotten, or dying? There is also much that is alive, that gushes with vitality, that pierces through the darkest ruins. In our catastrophic age, so full of discouragement, how many attempts to do well, to do better, do we find?

How touched we are when we discover the resistance to evil that remains in many souls, in souls surrounded by selfishness, money, and every temptation, which are nevertheless able to overcome these evils and become lights in the darkness for those around them! Let's look for such examples and imitate them.

Gradually, this feeling will grow with us: "Why can't I do what they have done?" And thus drawn toward the good, toward self-giving, we will find ourselves walking steadily on the road to sanctity instead of dizzying ourselves and others with corruption and baseness. T
