A Symbol of Blessing

"He saved others, Himself He cannot save." These words we will hear again and again this week with the Passion story. We ask ourselves, could Jesus not have saved Himself?

He might have followed the advice of His friends and avoided Jerusalem altogether.

He might have left the garden instead of quietly waiting for Judas.

He might have compromised with the priests and made a bargain of future silence with Caiaphas.

Had not Pilate almost pleaded with Him for an excuse, any excuse, for not sending Him to His death?

He might have made His Kingdom political instead of spiritual. That would have pleased and silenced Judas. He might have chosen the expedient.

As He Himself reminded Peter, He might have called upon twelve legions of angels to rescue Him and to show His great power.

Yes, He might have saved Himself. He had the power. Many ways of escape were available... But then He would never have been our Savior!!

Had not Christ said, "I am the good shepherd: the good shepherd gives His life for His sheep"?... **Gives His life?...**

Could not our salvation have happened without that final price?

NO! For when you and I sin to the uttermost, when sin sinks us to our very lowest point, no mild remedy can help us.

What then? In a world where death by crucifixion was still possible, no polite and perfumed half-measures could suffice.

A **blood transfusion** was necessary...rich, red blood, human blood, divine blood. And if talk of blood offends us, let us remember that crucifixion would offend us, too.

Perhaps we need to be reminded that our religion is not all sweetness and light.

Christianity is much more than pretty pictures of Jesus among flowers and singing birds, moving with a smile among simple folk. The Gospel is much more than the Golden Rule...much more than the Christmas Story and the fair green hills of Galilee.

Christianity deals with reality, with life as you and I experience it. For it recognizes that this is not always a pretty world. It is a world in which dreadful things can happen.

The faith that is nourished and sustained by the Spirit of God faces frankly these human situations that often make our faith difficult.

More than that, Christianity has a **cross** at the very heart of it. Leave out Calvary and Christianity dwindles to a weak and empty cult, to a system of impossible ethics.

Christ did not come into the world merely to proclaim a new morality or a code of ethics or to set up a new social order.

He did not show us how to work out our own salvation by good deeds, by charities, or by trying to live respectable lives.

Jesus came, He said, "To save that which was lost..." Jesus Christ came to save all those who were lost in the sense that they had lost their way.

That is why a hideous cross has become the world's symbol of blessing.

Fraternity History

The first newsletter of the IMMACULATE **HEART OF MARY FRATERNITY** recorded that the first meeting of the fraternity was held on November 27, 1960 in the basement at St. James Parish in Arlington Heights. At that first meeting twelve Postulants (Inquirers) were welcomed into the fraternity. This is the description used at the time:

What is the Third Order?

The Third Order Secular of St. Francis is an association of the faithful who strive to achieve Christian perfection in the world, under the direction of the Franciscan Order and according to its spirit, but in a manner suited to life in the world. This they do according to the Rule drawn up for them by the Seraphic Father Francis, as approved and interpreted by the Apostolic See. (Canon Law, n 702)

In March 1961, the twelve Postulants were received as Novices (Candidates) into the Franciscan order.
